

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As rockets are fired from Gaza, MDA again assumes its role as Israel's national lifesaving organization.



The EMTs and paramedics of Magen David Adom recently found themselves in an all-too-familiar position, responding to people injured in rocket attacks as Gaza-based terrorists sent repeated fusillades into communities throughout Israel, particularly in the South.

On May 2, terrorists from Islamic Jihad initially fired dozens of rockets into the southern city of Sderot, sending Israelis scrambling to safe rooms in their homes and to public bomb shelters.

A week later, Israel launched Operation Shield and Arrow, targeting Islamic Jihad senior operatives in the Gaza Strip who were responsible for many attacks and planning others. During the entirety of the conflict that ended on May 13 with a cease fire, Islamic Jihad launched 1,469 rockets toward Israel.

MDA treated 77 people, 32 of whom were hurt by shrapnel or debris or sustained injuries in the mad dash to shelter. Others suffered from acute anxiety prompted by the Red Alert sirens and relentless rocket explosions.

"The response of MDA's EMTs and paramedics was nothing short of heroic," said Eli Bin, Magen David Adom's director-general. "When other Israelis were taking shelter amid the rocket attacks, our men and women were risking their lives to save the lives of others, while rockets continued to rain down around them."

Two people were killed in Israel during the hostilities. An 80-year-old woman in the midst of wheeling her disabled husband to their safe room was fatally injured when their apartment in Rehovot was struck by a Qassam rocket. The woman's husband was moderately wounded.

Also killed was a Palestinian construction worker who was in Israel on a work permit and fatally injured when he was caught in an open area near his work site. Another Palestinian construction worker was

critically injured in the same blast, but received lifesaving aid from MDA paramedics, curtailing what otherwise would have been a higher death toll.

MDA leads Haifa training drill, intensive preparation for when the attacks are real.



MDA led a three-day training drill, culminating in a simulated multi-casualty event replicating missile attacks from Hezbollah. The drill took place in March at the Sammy Ofer Stadium in Haifa, a 30,000-seat arena.

The simulated attack began with two large explosions accompanied by smoke and the screams of a panicked public one would expect at such a scene. It involved more than 50 ambulances, 200 MDA paramedics and EMTs, a special IDF reserve unit composed of MDA EMTs, police, and fire rescue personnel, and 150 teens who served as stand-ins for injured people.

Even though this has never happened, "that's not to say that it never will," said Magen David Adom's head of disaster response, Senior Paramedic Lt. Col. (res.) Felix Lotan.

"An important part of our job is to prepare for crisis. We're charged by Israel's 1950 Magen David Adom Law to help manage the medical response to any type of disaster affecting the country's population, whether because of extreme weather, fire or flood, earthquake or hazmat, terror or war."

While the three-day Haifa exercise was the largest MDA has ever led, cross-agency drills feature regularly on its annual calendar. One held last November addressed the threat of a chemical attack.

"Mindful of the sarin released in a Tokyo subway in 1998, we held a drill in a Tel Aviv railway station, three levels below ground," said Guy Caspi, MDA's director of hazardous materials, exercises, and operational training. "The police cleared the scene following the simulated attack, security personnel tracked the 'perpetrators,' Israel Railways staff handled the rail traffic, and we took care of the emergency medical intervention and getting the 'casualties' up to street level, where our ambulances took them to the hospitals."

The goal of these drills is to learn and be ready for whatever scenario may arise. "If you find nothing to learn, then either the drill is badly designed or its evaluation is poor," said Caspi. MDA's evaluation of each drill is comprehensive.

Caspi and his team examine how well each entity works together, how closely procedures and protocols are followed, crowd control, equipment and personnel availability and management, decisions made, and, of





course, the performance of first responders, paramedics, and EMTs.

"Our culture of ongoing training equips our paramedics and EMTs to cope with any catastrophe, whether naturally occurring or man-made," explained Lotan. "Last year, we ran 320 live-action emergency drills, responding to simulated plane crashes, shootings, train derailments, earthquakes, and more."

This past February, Lotan joined Israel's delegation to Turkey after that country's earthquake and helped pull a 12-year-old boy and a 23-year-old woman from the rubble. Both had been buried for almost 48 hours, and both were alive.

There are lessons taught by every drill, Lotan said, and MDA is especially encouraged by what it was able to test and learn from the simulated soccer stadium disaster.

"We'll be holding another large-scale multi-casualty exercise like this in a different part of the country in a few months' time," said Caspi.

Honoring the Memory of Bernard and Sally Marco



Ben (Bernard) Marco is remembered for the twinkle in his eye, for his incredible generosity to those he knew and didn't know, and as a fierce protector of his family and lifelong Zionist. Born in Poland, he was the eldest of six and the only one to survive the Holocaust. He endured numerous concentration camps and was liberated on a death march. He met Sally in a displaced persons camp.

Ben and Sally married and made a new life in Los Angeles. They had two children, Estelle and Noachim, and seven grandchildren. Ben's honesty, artistic talent, and fierce loyalty combined with Sally's business skills made for a perfect partnership. They became the owners of a premier custom upholstery shop, garnering an extensive list of celebrity clients and top designers frequently featured in Architectural Digest.

Their philanthropic endeavors established the UCLA Holocaust Studies Chair, a peritoneal dialysis unit, a recreation center for Israeli soldiers, and a founding membership of Holocaust Museum LA. Ben was moved to tears when learning about the opportunity to sponsor an ambulance for MDA. Unfortunately, illness prevented him from achieving this dream.

Following their parents' death, Estelle and Noachim knew the best way to honor their memory was to fulfill this dream and sponsor a lifesaving Mobile Intensive Care Unit ambulance. They also donated a state-of-the-art defibrillator and chest compressor. Estelle and Noachim believe these acts of *chesed* (kindness and love) — principles their parents lived by — for the people of Israel are the most meaningful and impactful way to honor their legacy.



Karen Posner: Fulfilling a Family Tradition



When AFMDA reached out to Karen Posner to thank her for 18 years of ongoing contributions and to welcome her to the MDA Loyalty Circle, she corrected us by saying it was "more like 118 years of giving." 

Neil and Ina Rae Fox, who have chaired the Boca-Delray event for some 20 years and are stepping down, were presented with an appreciation award.




